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CEO & Chair's Report

The year has seen some fantastic success and achievements across the sailing community in Northern Ireland. Firstly, we want to thank the volunteers, coaches, officials, instructors, clubs and training centres that have worked tirelessly to develop sailing over the past 12 months, your commitment, passion and dedication to the sport is invaluable.

A massive thank you to our main funding partners, Sport NI, RYA, The National Lottery and The Mary Peter's trust, who help the organisation and athletes to develop and grow and to our Board and staff team for supporting us to deliver the Navigating the Future organisational strategy.

We want to take this opportunity to highlight areas of work that we are particularly proud of linked to ambitions we set out in the Navigating the Future strategy launched in March 2023. We have seen significant increases in female and disability club membership numbers this year, of 10% and 30% respectively. With 'Improving Diversity' set as one of the organisational strategic aims it is fantastic to see the sport actively becoming more diverse. Programmes like Women on Water and Sailability have been priorities over the past 12 months but ultimately, it's the work of clubs up and down the country that are helping to make these positive changes.

We have further enhanced our impact in this area by accessing additional funding from The National Lotteries, Dormont Accounts fund that has enabled us to employ the first ever salaried and full time Sailability Officer over the next three years.

The launch of the NI Sailing Team was an exciting part of the last 12 months. When we launched the Navigating the Future strategy, we talked about how we wanted to raise the awareness, profile and recognition of sailors in Northern Ireland that help us to 'Celebrate the Sport' (one of our Strategic Foundations), alongside ensuring representing or making NI squads something to be proud of for sailors of all ages. We hope that the NI Sailing Team will go some way to doing this and you can find out more about the NI Sailing Team here.

Lastly thank you to the corporate partners that are supporting some of our fantastic programmes and events. We are delighted to have been able to announce two new strategic partners, John Minnis Estate Agents and RBCA, who are sponsoring the Youth Champs and WOW programme respectively.





Common Challenges

An outline of the common challenges identified across the sport that we are trying to help solve through our work



Inspire people to give their time

Overview

2024-25 has seen significant progress in delivering high-quality training and development opportunities across Northern Ireland, ensuring a growing, skilled workforce to support sailing and water sports participation. Our targets have not only been met but exceeded in many areas, with increased access in rural locations and the introduction of new qualification levels.

Workforce Qualification and Course Delivery

Over the reporting period, a total of 93 new qualifications were awarded to coaches, instructors, and officials. This was achieved through the successful delivery of 15 training courses, exceeding the original target of 10. As a result, participants now hold formal credentials that equip them to take on paid roles or volunteer within clubs and training centres.

Race Coaching

- Three Race Coach Level 2 Courses were delivered, qualifying 18 new coaches.
- One Race Coach Level 3 Course delivered the first ever to be held in Northern Ireland — with seven participants.

Dinghy & Senior Instructor Development

Three Dinghy Instructor courses were successfully delivered, resulting in 18 newly qualified instructors. In addition, 27 individuals completed the pre-entry assessment, preparing them for future qualification.

Although the planned Senior Instructor course in Northern Ireland had to be cancelled, all affected candidates were supported in finding suitable alternatives with the UK or in Dublin. This ensured continued progress in developing leadership within the instructional workforce, despite local delivery challenges.



Volunteers at work

The first ever Wingsurfing Instructor course in NI was delivered, qualifying five instructors to support growing Olympic-aligned board sports; delivered with Newtownards SC, RYA, and UK Wingsurfing Association.

Coach Development & Retention

Coach Development Programme

- 93 opportunities delivered through seven workshops, mentoring, shadowing, and CPD
- 41 female coaches (44%) participated
- One on-water CPD session delivered (one cancelled due to low uptake)
- 26 shadowing/mentoring opportunities, 14 (54%) female
- 24 paid work opportunities, nine (38%) of which were female
- Coach development included both technical training and key safety messaging

RYA National CPD

In the autumn of 2024, five coaches were funded from NI to travel to Rutland to join in with coaches from across the UK for a development opportunity. Coaches in attendance discussed teaching practices, how their programmes ran and were supported by a depth of coach tutors and RYA staff for the weekend. The feedback from the weekend was great with coaches taking a lot from it to put back into their own coaching.

As part of our coach engagement programme, we facilitated 33 mentoring, shadowing, and work opportunities, with 14 of those (54%)

Regional Training Day

- Held in March with 46 attendees, 18 female (39%)
- Covered 14 clubs/centres; attendees chose from 4+ workshops
- 67% reported learning something new
- Key platform for disseminating RYA updates and best practices

This is our key instructor and coach engagement of the year. Ran in March to help prepare principals and instructors for the season ahead. The feedback from the day was phenomenal, with one of the key highlights being our OnBoard session delivered by Scottish Trainer, Jane Campbell Morrison. Attendees also enjoyed the chance to get on the water, all be-it in cold and blustery weather.

Rules Roadshows

Four events were delivered across EDYC, PSC, ABC, and BBC, with 133 attendees,
 reinforcing essential racing rules knowledge and encouraging official pathway engagement.

Volunteer recruitment and engagement - We're All In (WAI) Programme

The 'We're All In' Programme was established to impact our strategic aim of 'inspiring people to give their time.' We are consistently told by clubs and affiliates that they do not have enough volunteers to achieve their goals and that the current operation is in jeopardy due to the few volunteers who do the lion's share of the work. Five clubs were supported with funding, culminating in six volunteer recruitment and engagement events, engaging 150 volunteers.

Maximise Athlete Potential

Youth Performance Programme - NI Sailing Team

The most notable progress within our performance programmes is the launch and integration of the NI Sailing Team.

This replaces the Youth Performance Programme and helps to create an increased sense of belonging for the sailors and pride from the NI Sailing communities as set out in the Navigating the Future strategy. We hope it also provides greater opportunities to attract sponsorship and run new programmes under this banner. A new NI Sailing Team website has also been created alongside this rebrand that will give us more capacity to celebrate and empower sailors.

10 Topper and **13** ILCA sailors were selected for the 24/25 NI Sailing Team. The programme continues to provide scheduled coaching across six weekends a year over the winter months and this year included supported fitness sessions and testing. For the first time, **8** RS Feva sailors were selected to be in the NI Squad, while still running open training to support the wider fleet growth.

The amount of funding secured for NI sailors from various pots of funding has decreased this year, mainly due to a reduction in SNI allocations as other sports were prioritised in an Olympic year.

Female Membership

RYA Northern Ireland's goal to reach 3,633 female members (10% growth) across the region has been successfully achieved.

Through the continued efforts of the Women on Water (WoW) programmes and the commitment of clubs delivering tailored initiatives to meet the needs of their members, female participation has grown significantly. Female membership now stands at 40.3% (3,896 members)—a strong reflection of the progress made.

However, this is just the beginning. We remain committed to building on this momentum and continuing to grow female involvement in boating across Northern Ireland.

W&G Pulse Survey

This survey gathered responses from 40 individuals identifying as female across a range of age groups and sailing backgrounds. The purpose was to evaluate perceptions and changes since the 2023 Women & Girls (W&G) research, focusing on participation, inclusion, and development opportunities in sailing clubs and programmes.

Key Findings

Awareness and Impact of the 2023 W&G Report:



Agreed or strongly agreed that their club had implemented recommendations from the W&G's research project.



Said they have seen some or significant change in celebrating female role models.



Said they have seen positive change in the opportunities for women and girls in sailing through RYA NI.



Said they have seen some or significant change in the profile and publicity of women and girls in sailing.

There were a number of suggestions that came from those completing the survey that including to continue promoting the W&G's report through digital channels and club meetings, support participation pathways by tailoring programmes by skill level and offer flexible formats, highlight stories of women leaders and male allies.



Said they feel as though they have seen positive change in the coverage of W&G's in the sport on RYA NI social media channels.

WOW Programme

The Women on Water (WOW) programme continues to be an integral part of many clubs' seasonal planning. It's fantastic to see the programme being embraced and made available by clubs, offering opportunities for women of all experience levels—from complete beginners to seasoned sailors—to get involved.

This season, six clubs ran WOW programmes, with four receiving support through Active Clubs grants. These grants helped create opportunities for 93 women to participate across various water-based activities. One club noted:

The WOW programme is a fabulous opportunity to get ladies on the water and discover the different possibilities—whether it's dinghy sailing, keelboat, paddle boarding, or powerboating. Having a welcoming and relaxed group of women helps build confidence to try something new while forming lasting friendships.

Women on Water Development Programme

Following a strong expression of interest the Water on Water programme expanded to include a new initiative: the Women on Water Development Programme. This programme was designed to build the skills and boost the confidence of newly recruited female sailing members.

In 2025, four separate programmes were delivered across four clubs: Ballyholme Yacht Club, Donaghadee Sailing Club, Royal Ulster Yacht Club, and East Down Yacht Club. In total, 92 participants took part and benefitted from this focused development opportunity.

East Down Yacht Club ran their WOW Development Programme in March, just ahead of the 2025 sailing season. The event was a huge success, with 11 members getting out on the water and building their sailing abilities in a supportive and encouraging environment.

I took up sailing aged 50, having thought this sport was inaccessible as an adult, and would be too expensive. I was wrong about the perceived barriers, and I have instead been introduced to wonderful group of people at EDYC who have helped me slowly develop skills and confidence.

WOW Festival

The <u>2024 WOW Festival</u> at Royal North of Ireland Yacht Club was a huge success. The club delivered a fantastic day getting 44 participants out on the water.

As usual it was a mixture of new participants to the sport and regular sailors all wanting the same – to get out on the water, meet new friends and have fun! This was certainly achieved with positive feedback and RNIYC pulled out all the stops when they brought out a WoW cake.



It was a SUPER event, well organised, inclusive and instructive – plus you ordered the weather I met wonderful women there too, & will hopefully be trying other courses with some of them going forward.

Sailability

We continued to support the fantastic work of the 3 Sailability Clubs in Northern Ireland.

Two Sailability programmes were supported through the Active Clubs grants providing sailing opportunities for 55 participants. RYA NI Sailability Coordinator, Ken Curry, continued to travel to all three Sailability clubs to support their development.

Two Sailability forums occurred over 2024 with 20 attendees joining to discuss priorities, challenges and partnership working. We will continue these successful forums allowing clubs to network and provide support for each other.

Disability membership makes up 5.3% of NI overall membership. To record the most accurate representation we need clubs to understand their current membership make up and to report in the membership census. We have 28% of clubs reporting members with a disability.

Sailability Open

The inaugural <u>Sailability open in 2024</u> proved a huge success. Belfast Lough Sailability, Foyle Sailability and Lough Erne Sailability each ran a Sailability open with 84 participant experiences in total: Lough Erne Yacht Club – 30, Belfast Lough Sailability – 26, Foyle Sailability – 28.

Re-imagined Pathways

Female Focus Camp

The <u>Female Focus Camp</u> was held on the 27th and 28th April 2024 engaging 23 girls between the ages of 12 and 21.

Attendees heard from athletes and coaches who showcased the journey of the Olympic pathway, and the importance of training, competing outside their club, trying different boats and having the knowledge of 'what it takes' to pursue the performance pathway. The female only space allowed for conversations led by coaches about managing female health and menstrual cycles in the sport with over 50% of participants going away more confident in their knowledge of managing their menstrual cycle when training and competing.

The weekend led to many of the female sailors going away motivated and enthused about the opportunities in sailing where we see a high drop out rate between the ages of 14 and 18.

The weekend made me feel so inspired to continue in the sport and to persevere throughout all my sailing training and racing.

Team Racing

Several Team Racing sessions were held early in the 2024 season, engaging over **40** new participants across three locations. The sessions had extremely positive feedback with 100% of participants saying they would recommend Team Racing to others. Unfortunately, the challenges with access to boats and club capacity to run an additional element to their programme meant a decision was made to pause the delivery of Team Racing activity and we will monitor this as an area of development in the future.

Transition days

<u>Transition Days</u> were brought in to support the drop out we experience as junior sailors move into youth classes and youth into senior. Sailors' abilities, size and weight all come into account when changing class and many drift away from the sport if they don't find the right boat or partner to sail with.

These sessions were designed to showcase the recommended classes in NI, allowing participants to try out boats and meet new boat owners and class association reps. Many have now moved into these classes and/or sail with others following these experience days, linking them into the wider NI Sailing Community. Two transition days were held with 35 attendees, 22 of which were female.

OnBoard

In 2024 RYANI had ten OnBoard providers delivering activity to young people. Three OnBoard providers received funding from the Active Clubs grants including the introduction of a school's programme.

Overall, OnBoard achieved over 150 new participant opportunities & 470 regular participant opportunities.

The OnBoard Development Day ran alongside the Regional Training Day and Jane Campbell-Morrison came across the water to share their Onboard knowledge both on and off the water.

Connect and Empower

RYA Connected

The <u>RYA Connected</u> events are extremely important for our affiliates to network and learn from each other. In 24/25, 22 Connected events were held ranging from Sailability forums, Conferences and online workshops. Overall, we had 258 attendees from 78% of NI clubs.

The RYA NI Connected Conference kick started the Connected events, and we were delighted to have 36 attendees from 17 clubs. The theme of the conference was "Creating a safe and welcoming environment for all". RYA Head of Regions Gareth Brookes & Programmes Manager Michelle Gent came from RYA HQ to deliver workshops on Safety Management systems & volunteering.

Talks from clubs across NI on the WOW Programme, youth sailors & the OnBoard programme, Junior Committees and an insight into East Downs Yacht club #weareEDYC initiative. Thanks to Ballyholme Yacht Club, Donaghadee Sailing Club, East Down Yacht Club, Strangford Sailing Club for sharing their stories.

Following the re-introduction of the **Commodore-Vice Commodore evening** in 2023, this was held again in 2024 continuing the theme of Governance. NICVA delivered a workshop on Good Governance and the RYA affiliation process and RYA Compliance Toolkit were also discussed.

RYA Club Affiliation

Since 2024, RYA have been asking all new and existing affiliates to let us know who they are delivering activity for and the policies and procedures they have in place to support this as part of the new club affiliation process. As a result of this information, RYA have been able to evolve a programme of support for our affiliates and their volunteers.

Currently, 27% have either fully or partially completed the affiliation process. We have a target of 40% of clubs completing this by the end of 25/26.

Membership Census

In 2024 the census reported 9670 club members, with overall RYA NI club membership (including University clubs and Charity clubs) standing at 9838 a 0.9% growth. With the cost-of-living crisis, this increase is a positive outlook with more joiners in 2024 than 2023. Whilst we always strive to grow our sport it is just as important to retain current members and with a churn rate of 8.1% (significantly better than the UK average of 12.2%), this shows clubs are doing a lot right.



In 24/25 we widened the scope for the Active Club grant programmes to include membership retention and several clubs applied for race training, skills development, OnBoard and WOW programmes for their own members. The following programmes were supported through an Active Clubs grant.

Lobby and Advocate

We continue to look at how we can elevate the voice of sailing and boating and that of our members. There have been two significant developments in this area over the past 12 months.

- Following a significant amount of work alongside Stephen Dunne MLA and PSNI, a flare disposal day was organised in June 2024 where an unprecedented 4000 flares were disposed of across three locations: Bangor Marina, Portrush Marina and Lough Erne Yacht Club.
- We have also seen the launch of the Clean Water Sports Alliance NI. The Clean Water Sports Alliance was launched in England in April 2024 and alongside the NI Sports Forum, we have been meeting with several other water sport National Governing Bodies to look at how we best lobby for clean water in NI. The RYA NI have been one of the leading organisations in establishing this and led the work of the Alliance in presenting this to the All-Parliamentary Group for Sport and at the official launch of the CWSA NI in Stormont in front of Minister's and MLAs across various parties.

The C&E Committee continues to operate well, with a new Chair coming into place from January 2025. Isabel Hood took over from Roy Totten who had Chaired the C&E Committee for close to ten years, we thank Roy for his dedicated service to this role and thank and welcome Isabel for coming forward as the new Chair. We also had two members of the C&E Committee coming on board, with Sam Purdon and Kieron Black. Jacquie Patton stepped down from the Committee and we thank her for her continued support.

Strengthen Governance

24-25 saw a significant moment for RYA NI, with a move to charitable status officially signed off by the Charity Commission NI in February 2025. Thank you to our affiliated bodies for supporting an article change to satisfy the requirements of the Charity Commission NI.

Other notable developments in this area included:

- Sign off of the new Safeguarding Implementation Plan for RYA NI alongside CPSU.
- RYA taking on the role of Safeguarding Case Management Lead, which has helped to streamline and improve communication with members when managing safeguarding cases.
- A Board Appraisal took place to understand where improvements and progress can be made in Board operations and engagement.



Attract Funding

Firstly, a thank you to all those partners that have supported us over the 12 months of this report, with a special thank you to our main funders Sport NI, The National Lottery and RYA. Some highlights in this area include:

- Secured just over £118,000 over three years for a disability project, that includes funding for a full time paid Sailability Officer role.
- Secured over £6000 from ten partners in sponsorship towards the RYA NI 50th Anniversary Dinner.
- Maintained level of SNI funding at £274,000.
- Secured a **three-year partnership** with Accountancy firm, RBCA, for sponsorship of the Women on Water programme.
- Secured a **three-year partnership** with Estate Agents, John Minnis, for sponsorship of the RYA NI Youth Championships.
- Developed marketing packs that we can send to potential partners/sponsors to invest in RYA NI/NI Sailing Team programmes.
- Raised £3000 from a raffle at the 50th Anniversary Dinner which supported the launch of an Individual Grant Scheme to support people from disadvantaged groups to start, continue or progress in sailing.





Financial Summary

Figure 1. Income




Figure 2. **Expenditure**
